


## State-wise Project Details

### Ongoing Projects

#### Welfare Hospitals

TRY is running two welfare hospitals under the Tribal Welfare department of the Jharkhand government. These hospitals are situated at Gando (Dumka) and Tigra (Ranchi) Jharkhand which is likely cater to the healthcare needs of tribal communities, providing medical services in addition to facilitating specialized care of adolescent and women such as distribution of free sanitary pads to women and girls Education and awareness programs on menstrual hygiene, Counselling and support services for girls and women experiencing menstrual disorders or difficulties.

#### Mega Skill

At the Palojori, Devipur (Deoghar Dist.) and Kanke, Ormanjhi (Ranchi Dist.) of Jharkhand, TRY is engaged in a Mega Skill project under the Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Kaushal Vikas Yojana. This initiative aims to provide skill development training and employment opportunities to rural youth. Providing different trade such as General Duty Assistant (GDA), Dresser (Medical), Assistant Electrician (AE), Solar Panel Installation Technician (SPIT), Sewing Machine Operator (SMO), Mega - Beauty Therapist, Handset Repair Engineer, Gas Tungsten Arc Welding, Retail Sales Associate, Guest Service Executive-front office.

#### TB Intervention (PPSA)

TRY is involved in TB (Tuberculosis) intervention programs in 17 districts of Jharkhand, 7 District of Bihar and 24 District of Assam. Patient provider Support Agency program likely includes activities related to TB awareness, screening, and diagnosis, treatment, and support services.

#### TI Project: Jharkhand state AIDS control society Jharkhand

TRY is implementing a TI (Targeted Intervention) project in two districts Hazaribagh & Boakro of Jharkhand. TI projects focus on providing specific interventions and services to key populations who are at high risk of HIV infection, such as Sex workers, Transgender, Migrants Population and Men who have sex with men (MSM).

#### Ayush YOGA project under Ministry of Ayush Jharkhand

TRY is working on a YOGA project under Ayush. Ayush is a flagship healthcare scheme in India and the YOGA project may involve promoting and providing yoga-based interventions for health and well-being.

### **ITI, PPP Mode – (Industrial Training Institute)**

Functioning under the government of Jharkhand at Ormanjhi, Ranchi and Palojori, Deoghar, Jharkhand.

### **Livelihood**

Agarbatti Making Unit at Devipur, Deoghar 15 Numbers of SHGs are engaging for income generation through Agarbatti Making with cow dung with market linkage for selling their product.

### **Health Camp Intervention:**

TRY has expanded its project under the CSR initiative, supported by Aabhiskaar Foundation, in three states: West Bengal, Chhattisgarh, and Odisha. We are committed to working with underprivileged populations in these communities.

### **Welfare on Adolescent Girls (CSR)**

TRY is actively working in two states Jharkhand and Rajasthan to promote the welfare of adolescent girls under the CSR project supported by Ageas Federal Insurance. Our initiatives include providing nutritious food, conducting health awareness camps in schools, and reaching out to underserved areas. Through these efforts, we aim to empower young girls and ensure their well-being and development.

### **“Clinic on Wheel” SBI Sanjivani Foundation**

TRY has recently expanded its coverage in Bihar, focusing on remotely situated villages. We are providing essential healthcare services through a Mobile Health Unit, supported by the SBI Foundation's CSR initiative.

### **Mobile Health Unit exclusively for Tuberculosis:**

TRY has received the opportunity to work exclusively with tuberculosis patients in two districts of Bihar, supported by SBI Foundation CSR, through a Mobile Health Care Unit.


## Impact and Achievements

### Welfare Hospital


TRY operates, maintained and managing this hospital since 2020, the Welfare Hospital in Tigra, Ranchi and Gando, Dumka, Jharkhand, has been a beacon of hope for underprivileged communities, particularly the Scheduled Tribes (ST), Scheduled Castes (SC), minorities, and backward classes. Situated in an area predominantly populated by tribal communities, the hospital provides free healthcare services to a large population across its catchment areas, addressing critical medical needs despite significant infrastructural challenges.

Table 1.1: April 2024 to March 25 (Number of Patients).




From April 2024 to March 2025, Tigra Hospital provided a total of 35,876 services across various departments. The highest number of services was in General Medicine, with 21,695 consultations, followed by Pediatrics at 6,532. Gynecological services accounted for 2,402, while Dental and Ophthalmic services totaled 548 and 3,842, respectively. Emergency services were rendered to 828 patients, and there were only 29 inpatient admissions. Notably, Overall, the data reflects a diverse range of medical services, with a strong emphasis on outpatient care.


### Annual Performance of Welfare Hospital, Gando Dumka (April 2024 - March 2025)

- The welfare hospital in Gando Dumka has demonstrated remarkable performance over the past year, with a total of 33,266 patient visits across various services. This significant number highlights the hospital's vital role in the community and its commitment to providing comprehensive healthcare.
- In General Medicine, the hospital treated 21,845 patients, reflecting its status as the primary healthcare provider and the trust placed in its services. The consistent patient numbers across the quarters indicate a stable demand for general health services.

- The Paediatric department also performed exceptionally well, with a total of 7,698 visits. This underscores the hospital's dedication to child health and the importance of preventive care in ensuring a healthy future for the younger population.
- In the Gynaecology department, the total of 843 consultations demonstrates a growing awareness and utilization of women's health services, which are crucial for community well-being.
- The Dental department recorded 1,350 visits, indicating an increasing recognition of the importance of oral health among the community. This reflects the hospital's efforts to provide holistic health services.
- The Ophthalmic (Eye) services, with 945 consultations, highlight the hospital's commitment to addressing vision-related health issues, ensuring that patients receive necessary eye care.
- Lastly, the Emergency department treated 585 patients, emphasizing the hospital's role in providing immediate care for urgent health needs, which is essential in any healthcare setting.



**Coverage:** We have not only met but exceeded our target, achieving 43,126 against a goal of 40,000. This demonstrates our effective outreach and engagement strategies.

**Active Population:** Our active population has reached 10,011, slightly surpassing our target of 10,000. This indicates our success in retaining participants and ensuring they remain engaged with our services.


**Counseling:** With an achievement of 4,013 in counselling, we have exceeded our target of 4,000. This reflects our commitment to providing essential support to our community.

**HRG on ART:** Although we do not have a specific target for HRG on ART, we have successfully enrolled 3 individuals. This initial progress is promising and lays the groundwork for future growth in this area.

## Performance Report: TRY (CC) Hazaribagh

We are thrilled to share the achievements of TRY in Hazaribagh, which has made remarkable progress in HIV/AIDS prevention among female sex workers (FSW), men who have sex with men (MSM), and transgender individuals (TG).

### Key Highlights

#### 1. Exceeding Active Population Targets:

- FSW: We engaged 894 individuals, surpassing our target of 700.
- MSM: With 135 individuals, we exceeded our target of 100.
- TG: Achieving 62, we also surpassed the target of 50. This demonstrates our effective outreach strategies and the trust placed in our services.

#### 2. Successful New Registrations:

- We welcomed 172 FSW, 22 MSM, and 7 TG into our programs. This increase shows our commitment to expanding our reach and supporting more individuals

#### 3. High Clinic Footfall:

- Our clinics saw 2,958 visits from FSW, 470 from MSM, and 192 from TG. These numbers indicate strong community engagement and the effectiveness of our services in meeting health needs.

#### **4. Robust HIV Testing Initiatives:**

- We conducted 1,029 HIV tests for FSW, 144 for MSM, and 49 for TG. These efforts reflect our dedication to promoting awareness and early detection.

#### **5. Comprehensive Screening for Syphilis:**

- With 1,435 FSW, 191 MSM, and 82 TG screened, we are prioritizing comprehensive sexual health, ensuring that individuals receive the necessary care.

#### **6. Impressive Condom Distribution:**

- A total of 109,606 condoms were distributed to FSW, 11,256 to MSM, and 3,396 to TG. This significant outreach reinforces our focus on safe practices and prevention.

#### **7. Initial Progress in ART Access:**

- We have enrolled 10 FSW and 3 MSM in antiretroviral therapy (ART). While there is room for growth in this area, these numbers lay a foundation for expanding ART access in the future.

### **DDUKK Centers under TRY - Fiscal Year 2024-25.**

It is with great pleasure that I present this brief annual report outlining the progress and achievements of the Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Kaushal Kendra (DDUKK) centers managed by TRY under the Jharkhand Skill Development Mission Society for the fiscal year 2024-25.

#### **Vision & Objective**

The initiative aims to boost youth employability and economic participation in Jharkhand and India by providing skill development training. It seeks to reduce unemployment and inequality, foster entrepreneurship, attract investment in the skill sector, and support government policy. Crucially, it focuses on delivering quality, cost-effective training to produce skilled individuals, especially from disadvantaged backgrounds.

#### **Deen Dayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra (DDU-KK).**

A sub-scheme of Jharkhand's Mukhyamantri Sarthi Yojna, aims to bridge the employment gap by providing industry-aligned vocational training to youth. Managed under a PPP model by JSDMS, DDU-KK offers long-term residential programs with in-depth technical expertise and mandatory on-the-job training. These comprehensive courses, held in a 25,000 sq ft facility, include 160 hours of soft skills training alongside a minimum of 576 total hours.

ITI at Ranchi & Deoghar districts respectively. TRY ITI's are first of its kind in offering trades of Healthcare Sector, our various vocational training programs are aimed at developing skilled workers in different trades. Projects undertaken in our ITI colleges often focus on practical applications of the skills learned during the training. Here's an overview of our ITI college project:

- **Trade-specific Projects:** Our Projects are tailored to the specific trade or course being pursued, such as Radiology Technician, Physiotherapy Technician, Health & Sanatory Inspector, Cosmetology, Solar Technician, Smart Phone Technician & Electrician. ## CSR-Welfare Program on Adolescent Girls.

### Jharkhand Chapter.

A state in eastern India, it faces a unique set of challenges and opportunities shaped by its health, socio-economic, cultural, and educational contexts. To improve the lives of adolescent girls, TRY partnership with Ageas Federal Insurance has launched a comprehensive program aimed at enhancing the welfare of adolescent girls in Jharkhand. The initiative is focused on behavioral change, improvement of the health status, and community engagement, addressing critical issues faced by young girls in the region.

### Workshops and Community Engagement

As part of the initiative, eight workshops were organized in Ranchi and six workshops in Deoghar. These workshops aimed to educate participants about health, nutrition, and personal development, empowering adolescent girls to make informed decisions about their well-being. The workshop reflect the goal of SDG to improve the health status of girls in respective state.



### Nukkad Natak (street plays)

Street Plays were performed with the theme of "Sunu, Samjho, Aur Badlo." To further engage the community, a total of 10 street plays were performed across various locations in Ranchi and 15 street plays in Deoghar. These performances creatively conveyed important messages related to health, nutrition, and gender equality, reaching a wider audience and fostering community discussions.


### Health Initiatives

A special health camp was organized exclusively for adolescent girls in Tigra, Ranchi. This camp provided essential health services, including check-ups, counselling, and education on reproductive health. Such initiatives are crucial in addressing the unique health challenges faced by adolescent girls in the region. A total of 120 Girls has received health services through the health camp.


## Distribution of Kits

To support the nutritional needs and personal hygiene of adolescent girls, nutritional food kits and hygiene kits were distributed. In total, 1,000 kits were provided in Ranchi, while 1,106 kits were distributed in Deoghar. 

## Rajasthan Chapter

In Jaipur, Rajasthan, a comprehensive welfare program aimed at improving the health and nutrition of adolescent girls has been implemented, addressing critical issues such as nutrition, hygiene, and overall well-being. This initiative is particularly significant in a region where cultural practices often affect the health and education of girls.

### Distribution of Nutrition and Hygiene Kits

One of the program's key components involved the distribution of 400 nutrition and hygiene kits. These kits were carefully designed to meet the specific needs of adolescent girls, providing essential items such as:

- **Nutritional supplements:** Including protein-rich food and fruits distributed to combat malnutrition
- **Hygiene products:** These include sanitary napkins, soaps, and informational materials about menstrual hygiene management.

The distribution took place in schools and communities, ensuring accessibility for all targeted girls. By partnering with local schools, and the key person of community the program aimed to create a supportive environment where girls could learn about health and hygiene in a safe setting.

### Mural Artwork Initiative

To further promote awareness about health and nutritional issues, a mural art project is currently in progress the design has been finalized. This initiative seeks to visually communicate important messages regarding:


- **Nutritional education:** Highlighting the importance of balanced diets and the role of various food groups.

The mural serves as a vibrant reminder of health issues, fostering discussions among community members and encouraging girls to prioritize their health.


## Details of Beneficiaries and Program
